On qualifying Prosthetists/Orthotists chose which specialty to practice in but our core skill sets are the same.

Prosthetists provide gait analysis and engineering solutions to patients with limb absence. Orthotists assess, diagnose and treat gait abnormalities and futer focussing on improvements of the second second

mobilise, eliminate gait deviations, reduce falls, reduce pain, prevent and facilitate healing of ulcers.

Orthotists working within acute ward based and rehabilitation, emergency depts, and primary care have a specialised skill set and will see unprecedented demand. We do not envisage redeploying any staff away from these services. An emergency repair service will be required for all prosthetic and orthotic services and will require core staffing.

Orthotists who work alongside AHP colleagues embedded in Stroke, Vascular and Diabetic foot teams will also need to continue to provide essential services to prevent admission and facilitate discharge. Advanced practitioners may be required to lead services to enable other staff to be redeployed.

Orthotists work in community services that are being transitioned down e.g. musculoskeletal services and general outpatient setting Orthotists are able to run and deliver these services through telehealth care during this time of crisis management.

As the experts at applying orthoses to the body our profession can easily be redeployed with minimal support to areas with staff shortages such as within fracture and trauma clinics. Orthotists are also experts in position management and pressure relief and can be utilised to support tissue viability services to prevent and treat ulceration. Gait assessment is core to our skill set and as such Prosthetist/orthotists can provide rehabilitation and gait re-education alongside the established rehab MDT. With support, clinicians can be used to facilitate discharge and assist in positioning.
